Over Twenty-Five Years of "Neighbors Helping Neighbors" Notes From The Pantry

From the Executive Director

Dear Friends,

Happy New Year! I hope you all had an enjoyable holiday season. It's been an eventful first year as Executive Director of this incredible organization, and there is much news to share with you.

As many of you may already know we had some staff changes in 2019. Doug McMahon, our beloved Volunteer Coordinator, retired at the end of 2019, and we welcomed Allison Sillence last November to fill this critical role. During the course of 2019 we had almost 400 staff volunteers donate over 25,000 hours to the pantry, and as you can imagine, a Volunteer Department that big has many moving parts! But working together they made the transition seamless. We also welcomed Kiley Powell, who thanks to a generous donor, was hired to coordinate the "Rosemary Gilmartin Legacy Education Program". She has been hard at work creating wonderful opportunities for the many people in our community, young and old, who seek to learn more about how to tackle the complex issues surrounding hunger in our neighborhoods. Lastly, this January, Val Schuszler agreed to fill our need for a full-time Mobile Pantry Associate and Food Drive Coordinator. He is another wonderful addition to the IFPRC family.

Now in its third year of operation, our Healthy Choices Mobile Pantry Program continues to grow as we identify needs across Morris County and expand our network of collaborative partners. With the recent addition of the **New Hope Food Pantry** in Oak Ridge, we are now working with *seventeen locations across Morris County*. These partners include food pantries, senior housing units and County Nutrition sites where we are providing a variety of items that encourage healthy eating including fresh produce, refrigerated dairy products, whole grains, and senior friendly foods. Combined with the regular visits to our pantries and our home delivery program, we accommodated nearly 22,000 unique visits in 2019, and distributed a new high of more than 1,222,000 pounds of food!

Our garden flourished and our Free Farmers Markets continued to grow in popularity and the amount of produce, dairy, meats and grains distributed through this program increased by 67%. Our community partners, including the Junior League of Morristown, Morristown Medical Center, the United Way, Single Stop, Legal Services of New Jersey, New Jersey Natural Gas, JCP&L, Zufall Clinic, Hispanic Affairs and the Helen Keller Foundation, among others, provided wrap-around services that included health and benefits screenings, energy assistance, free income tax preparation, nutrition education, free eye exams and glasses and many other services to encourage self-sufficiency and ensure the well-being of the thousands who visited our Resource Center. We're so grateful to all of them and look forward to continuing our partnerships throughout the new year.

We made strides in our sustainability efforts over the past year, making improvements to our solar power and expanding our farm and supermarket gleaning programs to "rescue" more foods from landfills. We also partnered with livestock facilities to repurpose waste, reduced our consumable plastic use and even piloted a program to re-use plastic laundry containers.

None of this would be possible without you and all the individuals and families, schools, scouts, houses of worship, businesses and foundations willing to give a little or give a lot to ensure everyone who seeks our help receives it in an atmosphere of dignity and respect. Together we make a significant impact! We look forward to strengthening our network and continuing to make strides against hunger and food insecurity in 2020. Our long range strategic plans to strengthen the food security network across the County are well underway and with your continued support we will continue to make a difference. Be sure to follow our story and stay up-to-date on all the happenings here through electronic, social and paper media.



On October 6th, the Interfaith Food Pantry participated in Action Against Hunger, the largest one-day food drive in the region. The event was sponsored by Fourth Edition Inc. (previously the Foundation of Northern NJ, Inc.) and has been helping to feed New Jersey residents through four major food pantries, including the IFP, since 1991.
